

CITY COUNCIL NO. 25-72

September 11, 1972.
7:00 p.m.

A Regular Meeting of City Council was held this evening with the following members present: His Worship Mayor E. C. Lumley, Aldermen G. Leger, A. LeBlanc, G. Samson, A. Clement, D. Webster, D. Fawthrop, F. Guindon, G. Cameron, A. Lebano, J. Pescod and M. Holden.

Presentation of Certificate - Alderman Fawthrop expressed his pleasure in presenting a certificate from Queen's University to Mr. Richard Thompson on the successful completion of the Municipal Clerks and Treasurers Course. The Mayor expressed his appreciation for the time spent on this course by Mr. Thompson.

Ontario Welfare Officers' Association - Miss Flanigan, who was unable to be present at this evening's meeting, is to be presented with a Certificate of Merit at the next meeting.

Environmental Pollution - Alderman Samson, on behalf of Mayor Lumley, members of Council and Mr. E. Myers, presented awards to the following four students for their project on "Environmental Pollution in Canada": Allan Harkin, John Witherspoon, Claude LeBrun and Mike Quinlan. Mayor Lumley also paid tribute to Mrs. Gertrude Lalonde who was present this evening who performed a great deal of work in helping the students in this project.

Adoption of Minutes - Moved by Alderman Pescod, seconded by Alderman Lebano that the Council minutes of the meeting held August 21st be adopted as received. Carried.

COMMUNICATIONS

1. St. Lawrence Seaway Authority - Canal Lands - Moved by Alderman Webster, seconded by Alderman Guindon that the letter be filed and that this question be debated in Committee of the Whole. Carried.
2. Eastern Ontario Development Council - Work carried out by E.O.D.C. - Moved by Alderman Clement, seconded by Alderman Leger that the letter be filed. Carried.
3. H. E. Meadd - Resignation from Suburban Roads Commission - Moved by Alderman Guindon, seconded by Alderman Lebano that Council accept, with regret, the resignation of Mr. Howard E. Meadd from the Suburban Roads Commission. Carried.

Mayor Lumley advised that he had written a letter of appreciation to Mr. Meadd and that a certificate is to be presented to him.
4. Post Office - Rural delivery - Moved by Alderman Webster, seconded by Alderman Guindon that the letter be filed. Carried.
5. City of Belleville - Community Centres grants - Moved by Alderman Fawthrop, seconded by Alderman Cameron that we endorse the submission made to the Ministry of Community and Social Services by the City of Belleville. Carried.
6. E.O.D.C. - Conference in Pembroke - Moved by Alderman Clement, seconded by Alderman Guindon that Alderman D. Webster attend the E.O.D.C. conference to be held in Pembroke on October 2nd and 3rd. Carried.
7. Office of the Attorney-General - Act respecting conflict of interest - Moved by Alderman Guindon, seconded by Alderman Leger that the memorandum from the Attorney-General with attached proposed

legislation be filed. Carried.

REPORTS

Committee of the Whole No. 20-72 - Moved by Alderman Clement, seconded by Alderman Samson that the report be adopted as received. Carried.

Community Transportation and Power Committee No. 6-72 - Moved by Alderman Cameron, seconded by Alderman Samson that the report be adopted as received with the deletion of the first paragraph regarding Smith's Transport and Norman's Transfer and also item #2 of the attached traffic agenda be changed to read - "north curb of Second Street to a point 65 feet north - east side" and the deletion of item #8 of said agenda. Carried.

With respect to parking on Adolphus Street between Second and Third Streets, Alderman Clement suggested that consideration be given to asphaltting the boulevards to permit angle parking in front of doctors' offices.

Alderman Guindon stated that, in his opinion, out of town buses delivering students to the schools is creating a traffic problem and asked that the School Boards be approached and definite bus stops designated.

Report on Sand for City's Landfill Refuse Disposal Site, Tender #40-72 - Moved by Alderman Pescod, seconded by Alderman Lebano that Jack's Haulage be awarded the tender for sand at the City's landfill refuse disposal site at a price of \$1.23 per cubic yard. Carried.

Report on installation of industrial and storm sewers - Pellon Corp., Misc. #4-72 - Moved by Alderman Pescod, seconded by Alderman Lebano that the report be adopted as received. Carried.

Canal Lands Development Committee No. 7-72 - Moved by Alderman Lebano, seconded by Alderman Webster that the report be adopted as received. Carried.

RESOLUTIONS

RE #62-72 - City of Cornwall

Moved by Alderman Guindon, seconded by Alderman Samson that the Mayor and Clerk be authorized to sign a Pipe Crossing Agreement No. 5400-L for permission to construct and maintain a 12 inch diameter watermain crossing at mileage 2.32 Wesco Spur. Carried.

RE #63-72 - City of Belleville - Hockey Canada

Moved by Alderman Leger, seconded by Alderman Pescod that the resolution from the City of Belleville be filed. Carried.

Moved by Alderman Guindon, seconded by Alderman Clement that the resolution from the City of Waterloo be endorsed. Carried.

Moved by Alderman Clement, seconded by Alderman Lebano that the Mayor and Clerk be authorized to sign a Pipe Crossing Agreement No. 5476-L for permission to construct and maintain a 42 inch diameter sanitary sewer crossing at mileage 65.37 Kingston Subdivision. Carried.

Moved by Alderman Guindon, seconded by Alderman Pescod that the by-laws be read a First and Second Time. Carried.

- 1315 - To establish a plan for the co-ordination of municipal emergency services

Moved by Alderman Lebano, seconded by Alderman LeBlanc that the by-laws be read a Third Time, Passed, Signed and Sealed. Carried.

NEW BUSINESS

Power Dam Interchange - Moved by Alderman Holden, seconded by Alderman Clement that the City ask for Township co-operation in having the Power Dam interchange finished in order to have all directions handled. The City would then be in a position

to designate Power Dam Drive as a truck route.

Illumination of Highway 401 Interchanges - Mayor Lumley reported that his first request to the Ministry of Transportation and Communications for illumination of the three interchanges had been declined and, as a result, he had asked that the Ministry consider lighting at the Brookdale Avenue entrance. He has now been informed that the Ministry was not receptive to this request but will agree, however, to partial illumination of the interchanges provided the City is willing to pay 50 percent of the cost of installation and 100 percent of the maintenance and operating costs.

Moved by Alderman Guindon, seconded by Alderman Webster that Alderman Cameron and the City Engineer consider this proposal when preparing next year's budget. Carried.

City Council - Alderman Lebano advised Council that he will be submitting, at the next meeting, a resolution asking that consideration be given to reducing, from 12 to 8, the number of aldermen.

Alderman Lebano stated that he took exception to insinuations made by Alderman Guindon that certain companies or people were financing persons running for Council. He pointed out that such statements are not fair and untrue and give a bad name to members of Council.

Alderman Lebano stated that another matter he wished clarified was that he was not complaining about the number of meetings and the time spent as a member of Council but when he referred to this question, it was for information purposes only and not in the form of a complaint.

Children's Aid Society - Alderman Fawthrop advised that, as a result of a Child Welfare Review Committee hearing requested by the City last year, the Ministry of Community and Social Services has now forwarded a cheque in the amount of \$17,775.00 to the municipality.

Pitt Street Overpass - Alderman Cameron suggested that, in future, when the City is giving out a job for a bridge or road, the City should make sure that the contractor is made to apply common sense so that cars will not scrape on the tressel.

School Parking Lot - Alderman Fawthrop asked that Council send a letter to the Board of Education with respect to the noise created in their parking lot on the north side of Fifth Street between Sydney and Amelia Streets. Alderman Fawthrop stated that he had been advised that the residents had contacted the School Board but did not receive much co-operation.

Truck Route - Alderman Clement suggested that the City investigate the possibility of re-routing trucks down Saunders Drive instead of Power Dam Drive.

City Council - Alderman Samson questioned Alderman Lebano on his suggestion to reduce the size of Council which would give a larger work load to each alderman in view of the fact that Alderman Lebano attended only three out of the eleven meetings of the Children's Aid Society held last year.

Protection to Indians - Alderman LeBlanc reported that, while attending a convention recently, he learned that the City of Sarnia gets a grant for protection given by the City to indians and felt that our City likewise should be paid for services given on Cornwall Island.

Alderman LeBlanc pointed out that the Fire Chief is an asset to any community and, in his opinion, the local Fire Chief is not getting proper recognition. He stated that, as a result of a recent large fire in the downtown area, he had sent a letter of thanks to the Fire and Police Chiefs and to Charlottenburgh and Cornwall Townships. Alderman LeBlanc also commended the Public Works Department for the assistance given at this time. With respect to fighting fires on Cornwall Island, he felt that we must get the assistance from the five-man police force patrolling the island.

Cornwall Industrial Show - Alderman Leger requested full support from Council and the news media for the Cornwall Industrial Show which is being sponsored by the Cornwall Chamber of Commerce on September 20th, 21st and 22nd. He stated that Mr. W. J. Lavigne, Assistant Deputy Minister, Department of Regional and Economic Expansion, will officially open the show and that, to date, fifty companies have indicated that they will participate.


Children's Aid Society - Answering Alderman Samson, Alderman LeBano related that he had asked to be removed as a member of the Children's Aid Committee at the time he became part of a committee to represent the City at the Child Welfare Review Committee Hearing.

Suburban Roads Commission - Moved by Alderman Guindon, seconded by Alderman Samson that Mr. Donald Ross-Ross be appointed for three years as the City's representative on the Cornwall

Suburban Roads Commission to fill the unexpired term of
Mr. Howard E. Meadd.

Alderman LeBlanc, Council adjourned into Committee of the Whole
